VI. •	RECEIVE Presentation from Lieutenant Brian Bonthron on the Office of the	
	Sheriff's Crisis Intervention Training provided to Contra Costa law	
	enforcement agencies-with Lt. Brian Bonthron and Victoria Singleton	
	Lt. B. Bonthron discussed that there are two types of CIT courses offered and	
	currently oversees the 32-hour course and V. Singleton oversees the 8-hour	
	course. The 32-hour course is offered twice a year with a maximum of 35	
	students/officers per class.	
	V. Singleton explained that the State currently mandates that all Field	
	Training Officer's (FTO) have at least the 8-hour course at the Law	
	Enforcement Training Center (LETC) in-service side of CIT. Individuals who	
	want to do more or learn more are welcome to attend the 32-hour course.	
	State mandates that Sheriff's Officers are required to have 3 hours of CIT	
	training per a 24-month period. All Sheriff's Officers have been trained in CIT.	
	V. Singleton informed that they can reach out and train fellow law	
	enforcement agencies that are not able to provide the training.	
	Lt. B. Bonthron explained that he oversees the secure units at CCRMC and	
	health centers, which include Deputy Sheriff's and Sheriff's Rangers (non-	

- sworn civilian uniform officers). The CIT training announcement is disseminated to all county sheriffs. Lt. B. Bonthron advised that they are focusing the 32-hour course on Contra Costa County law enforcement agencies.
- V. Singleton discussed that the academy has carved out space to hold the 8-hour CIT training. There is a segment called Persons with Disabilities and in addition, the last captain introduced CIT on top of the 8-hour course and have the training as the FTO. Lt. B. Bonthron explained that Alameda County has a CIT unit within the Sheriff's department and hold monthly CIT training
- V. Singleton informed that LETC is meeting next week and attended by all law
 enforcement agencies and there will be discussion of staffing. V. Singleton
 discussed that she has a background in Forensics Psychology and teaches at
 St. Mary's college and she has developed and received post for CIT 2 update
 course.
- Lt. B. Bonthron discussed that officers have been able to utilize CIT in situations which helped them to de-escalate the situation and connect individuals with services and is looking to develop a measurement to understand the effectiveness of CIT. G. Stern inquired if there was a way to have a decal/sticker on the dash of the patrol cars as a reminder of 211.
- Lt. B. Bonthron discussed the agenda for the CIT training. The first day allows
 the Office for Consumer Empowerment to participate and have consumers
 share their stories. The following day consumer family members can attend
 and share their story and perspective. The third day Dr. Fay is a retired San
 Rafael police officer, early pioneers of CIT, and founder of the West Coast
 Post Trauma Retreat.
- J. Kincaid inquired on what the post-retirement mortality rate is within the Sheriff's. Lt. B. Bonthron advised that he does not have that information now.

VII: DISCUSS September 24 site visit to the West County Detention Facility and lessons learned

• G. Stern discussed how the site visit took place and how it was odd that the group was only able to see portions of the jail that inmates were not utilizing that day. J. Kincaid mentioned that the community garden areas have not been taken care of. Lt B. Bonthron advised that this could be a result of the drought. W. Hayes discussed the issue with the individuals who had attended. J. Ray explained that if a committee requests to tour the detention facility, only the members of the committee can attend the tour. All other individuals will need to put in a separate request to the Sheriff's.

IX. DISCUSS and identify agenda items for upcoming Justice Committee meetings, potential guest speakers and site visits.

- G. Stern discussed the California Health Policy Strategies, LLC Policy Brief concerning Mental Health Diversion. J. Ray explained that funding is available to the county due to the high utilization of state hospitals if the county creates a plan.
- J. Kincaid and G. Stern had concerns with how and who have been identified
 as evaluators. C. Pierce explained a portion of clients who are getting mental
 health diversion due to evaluation at Napa State hospital or competency
 training and finding someone to make a diagnosis is not an issue. Forensic MH
 will take care of felony cases.
- G. Stern motioned for the justice system to review AB 1810 and Prop 47 to future agendas. D. Dunn seconded the motion.
