



VOTING RIGHTS IN THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY JAILS



AM I ELIGIBLE?

Can I vote while I am incounty jail?

You CAN vote while in county jail if you are:

- 18 years of age or older, and
- a citizen of the United States, and
- awaiting trial or on trial for any crime, or
- in jail for a misdemeanor con viction, or

- in jai I on a probation violation) or
- in jail on felony probation) or
- serving a county jail sentence under Rea lignmen t (AB 109).

The only time you CANNOT vote while in county jail is when you are:

- in jail awaiting transfer to a state or federal prison for a felony conviction) or
- in jail for a parole violation) or
- serving a state prison sentence under a contract with a county jail, or
- currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court.

*If you are not sure of your custody status or what type of sentence you are serving) please check with your parole or probation officer or con1plete and submit an In1nate Niessage slip requesting the information.

In California, you always keep your right to vote unless you are currently serving a state or federal prison sentence or currently on parole.

HOW DO I REGISTER FROM JAIL?

Voting Procedure and Materials

Per the Board of State and Co1n1nunity Corrections (BS CC) Title 15 Minimun1 Standards for Local Detention Facilities Article 6) Inmate Prograins and Services §1071- Voting:

The fa cilit y administrator of a Type I (holding sentenced inn1ate workers) II, III or IV facility shall develop written policies and procedures whereby the county registrar of voters allows qualified voters to vote in local, state, and federal elections, pursuant to election codes.

You must register to vote at least 15 days before Election Day.

Please follow the steps listed below if you would like to vote:

Con1plete an Inniate Request form requesting information and 1naterials by checking the "Voting Information" box.

The voting coordinator will contact you.

- Fill out your Voter Registration Card and Vot e-by-Mail Ballot Application. Include your booking nulnber on each. Return both to the facility voting coordinator or their designee.
- When you receive your ballot, mark your choices and return to the facility voting coordinator or their designee.
- You can find out if your vote-by-1nail ballot arrived at the county elections office, if your ballot was counted, and, if not, the reason why it was not counted by calling 800-8 15-2 6 6 6.

The ACLU SoCal Jails Project will also have volunteers go inside the LA County jail s to register individuals who are incarcerate d to vote.

HOW DO I REGISTER IF I'M NO LONGER IN CUSTODY?

You must re-register to vote when you are released fr01n custody. There are a few ways to re-/ r egist er to vote after your release:

- You can register online at <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>
 (http://registertovote.ca.gov/)
- You can pick up a paper registration form at the DMV, post office, public library, or your county elections office.
 Co1nplete the form, sign it, and drop it in the 1nail.
- You can call **800-3 4 5- VOTE** (8683) and ask for a registration fonn to be 1nailed to you.

*If you requested a vote-by-1nail ballot fro1n jail but are released from custody before you receive your ballot, you can still vote. Just go to the polling place for your ho1ne address or any polling place in the county where you are registered and vote a provisional ballot.

Federal law requires that the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recor der / County Clerk provide translated election 1naterials and bilingual support in English, Spanish, Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Cam bodian/Khmer, and Tagalog/Filipino. LA County also provides support in Hindi, Japanese, Thai, Farsi, Arn1enian, and Russian. If you wish to receive your voting 1naterials in a language in addition to English, please detail so on your Inmate Request form and Voter Registration Card.

If you are not a resident of Los Angeles County, you can still send a request for 1naterials to the **Los Angeles County**Regis trar-Re co rder/Coun ty Clerk (https://www.lavote.net/). The

LA County Registrar-Recorder will ensure that the request is sent to the appropriate county elections office.
