


Housing and Homeless Issues - Special Needs Housing Program (SNHP) - No Place Like Home (NPLH)	SNHP When MHSA began, the department California Housing Finance Agency (CalHFA) developed regulations around housing for individuals with serious mental illness. The CalHFA account currently has a balance of \$1.7 million for Contra Costa County. The county has until September 30th to decide whether they would like the \$1.7 million to stay at the State level under the control of CalHFA, or to be returned to the County for use as capital facility building or renovation purposes. If returned to the County the funds can be used for supportive housing needs, such as rental assistance.  NPLH Governor signed the bill (No Place Like Home) and the bill is in the waiting stage for 60 days for legal challenges of the constitutionality of the proposed law. Once the 60 day period, the regulations will be created to implement the bill. ## Workforce Education and Training Q & A

## Q. What are the five categories?

A. The five categories are Workforce Staffing Support, Training and Technical Assistance, Mental Health Career Pathways, Internship Programs, and Financial Incentive Programs.

## Q. Who all is eligible to benefit from funding from the WET component?

A. Everyone is eligible; such as care providers, community members, consumers, and family members.

## Q. What is an appropriate amount for a yearly budget?

A. Currently this information is not known. The System of Care committee has created sub-committees to address this issue. They will look at needs and what has been done and focus on the five categories. Sub-committees will come up with recommendations which they would like to be applied to the WET component. Starting next year the WET component does not receive yearly funding, like Community Services and Supports, Prevention and Early Intervention, and Innovation. Thus any funding designated has to be moved from unspent funds from previous years to the WET component. The System of Care committee will consider what is needed in the five categories, and advise what level of programming should be considered.

## Q. Can we allocate an amount for each category?

A. Yes, based on the recommendations developed by the stakeholders which will then be provided to the Behavioral Health Services Director and the Board of Supervisors to consider for approval.

## Q. By what amount should the current WET budget be expanded or reduced?

A. The WET budget can be expanded or reduced based on the recommendations developed by the stakeholders and approved by the Behavioral Health Services Director and the Board of Supervisors.

#### Q. Who or what group will determine how much money will be spent in WET?

A. The Systems of Care Committee with its sub-groups will provide input and advice that will go to the Behavioral Health Services Director and the Board of Supervisors. All stakeholders who have an interest in this area are encouraged to actively participate in this process.

## Q. What are we currently funding in the WET component?

A. Current funding is about \$650,000 per year. The largest portion of funding is for the Graduate Level Internship Program, and the second largest is for the Training and Technical Assistance category.

## Q. How many people are currently participating in WET funded activities?

A. We currently have approximately 70 funded interns throughout county operated and community based mental health programs, and the SPIRIT class will graduate this year about 50 individuals who

have consumer and/or family member experience. We do not have a county of all the participants in the various training and technical assistance endeavors.

## Q. What hasn't worked in the WET component and should not be re-funded?

A. We are currently looking at this issue in terms of conducting a workforce assessment in order to match current recruiting, retention and staff development needs with what we have been doing. The new line-up and budget of what we recommend going forward may look different than what we are currently doing.

## Q. Can we emphasize what WET funded activities are not being funded, but should be?

A. The state level mental health loan forgiveness program is sunsetting, and currently there is no support for further funding. If utilized properly this financial incentive program can be an effective recruiting and retention tool for filling and retaining positions where we are having difficulty, such as psychiatrists.

## Q. Has any unspent WET funds been reverted to the general unspent fund account?

A. No, there are no unspent WET funds that reverted to the state, and we foresee spending every dollar that was originally allocated to the County eight and nine years ago.

## Q. What is the current amount spent in WET to support families of mental health consumers?

A. Currently the support for families is designated as the \$20,000 contract to NAMI for conducting the Spanish speaking Familia de Familia program.

## Q. How can we ensure that WET funded activities are improving services to the seriously mentally ill?

A. We currently do not have metrics to measure impact. Measures will need to be created for this purpose.

## Q. How can WET dollars be used to assist those who have difficulty accessing WET funded activities?

A. Better access to WET funded activities will need to be built into the design and funding of those activities that are included in the three year plan.

# Q. What would be the needed qualifications, certifications or standards to approve funds for career ladder activities, such as school and/or training activities?

A. If we are considering putting funding towards career ladder activities, we will need to build into the design certifications, qualifications, and standards as outcome measures.

## Q. How can we support the supervision and support of community support workers (CSWs)?

A. This has been recognized, and the county encourages a workforce for individuals with lived experience. Currently there is not built-in support for these individuals who are on a career path. Again,

interested stakeholders are encouraged to participate in the Systems of Care Committee workgroups who are addressing the WET component for the next three year plan.

## Q. Can WET funds be used to

- Train volunteers? Yes
- Fund conferences? Yes
- Train judges, law enforcement, firefighters and other first responders? Yes
- Train for peer specialist certification other than SPIRIT? Yes
- Fund continuing education for peer specialists and family partners? Yes
- Augment innovation component funds? Yes
- Finance higher education via scholarships for TAY consumers? No, TAY consumers are consumers, and WET funding is for the workforce.
- Fund training and development opportunities for employees to enable promotional opportunities? Yes
- Fund equipment, supplies, business attire, job coaching for consumer job entry and retention? No, WET funding is for the workforce.
- Pay for recruitment efforts for hard to fill positions? Yes
- Pay for cultural competency training and sensitization to populations such as persons identifying as LGBTQ? Yes
- Support NAMI sponsored education and training projects to support family members of mental health consumes and volunteers who support family members of mental health consumers? Yes, but not just NAMI, but all appropriate organizations.
- Address specific gaps in the workforce who can represent special needs, such as language proficiency in languages other than English? Yes
- Pay stipends so that benefits are not affected? Yes
- Pay for training that prepares an individual for a non-behavioral health job? No.
- Pay for scholarships or reimburse for school costs? Yes, as long as the scholarships and reimbursement is part of the workforce who provide mental health care.

 Education and training for key community positions that should be more knowledgeable about mental illness, such as how to identify warning signs and make reasonable accommodations, such as employers and union officials? yes

Q. What information do I need to take with me when I am participating in other stakeholder committee/workgroup meetings?

A. All CPAW members and guests are encouraged to utilize the above information as well as keep current with planning developments in the next few months and use appropriate opportunities to inform and educate fellow stakeholders regarding the Workforce Education and Training Component.
