

Dialogue with Contra Costa Behavioral Health Services (CCBHS) Executive Staff Update on Anka Update on Agenda Readiness Form (ARF) Submitted by CTYA Adhoc 	Dialogue with Contra Costa Behavioral Health Services (CCBHS) Executive Staff Dr. Matthew White: • Newly Appointed Behavioral Health Director ○ Suzanne Tavano is now the Contra Costa Behavioral Health Director ○ She is an amazing partner and spirit with wisdom and knowledge combined • Anka Program ○ Anka was a community-based program that provided services throughout Contra Costa County ○ Anka Programs • Operated three residential programs - Nierika House, Nevin House, Don Brown Shelter • Phoenix Central Clinic • Two substance abuse disorder programs • Three MHSA housing units • Full-Service Provider ○ Anka filed for bankruptcy on May 1 st and officially closed as of May 31 st ○ Our number one priority was that no program closes down and no one loses treatment, services or housing (no one is left out on the street) ○ We stepped in quickly and in the last month worked quickly to identify providers that would be able to step in quickly, are of quality. We matched providers with the required services. ○ We did a lot of work in three and a half weeks ○ Happy to announce that, as of Monday, none of the programs have closed and that there is staff still operating these programs ○ We will ensure services transition as smoothly as possible and that funding is maintained	h	Dr. Matthew White, Director of Contra Costa Behavioral Health, Medical Director Suzanne Tavano, Contra Costa Behavioral Health Director

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	 New Service Providers Bay Area Community Services (BACS) – Run programs of similar nature in Alameda and Solano Counties For the Phoenix Center in Concord, the Hume Center (runs several Full-Service Partnerships and clinics) will provide services The Full-Service Provider in Central County will be Mental Health Systems (MHS) that currently runs the Assisted Outpatient Treatment Program for the County and assist in Phoenix Enterprises (a pre-vocational program) For the substance use out-patient clinics, Center Point (a service provider in Alameda and Marin Counties) will provide services Contra Costa Interfaith Housing will provide services for the three homes that provide MHSA permanent supportive housing for twelve residents Service Provider Contracts To provide services quickly, contracts were entered "as is" due to the emergency Some of these programs end at the end of the year and others run through 2019/2020 Contracts and services will be continuously evaluated Will later determine if will need to send out a Request for Proposals (RFP) Hired seventy new staff this past month and entered into new contracts 		

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	 Suzanne Tavano: It has been a busy three and a half weeks We really appreciate all the work people did to make this happen These new providers did an enormous amount of work to step in and provide services so quickly The work done in three and a half weeks would ordinarily take one year to complete We wanted to ensure that none of the programs closed, everyone continued to receive services, and no one was left out on the street and that has been accomplished Two of these providers (BACS and Center Point) are new to this County and will get to know everyone with the County and we will give them a lot of support and ensure they get off to a good start As usual, we will want to hear from stakeholders as how the transition is going and ensure we have things going in the right direction We look forward to working with these new service providers

	Q: So, these program contracts are tentatively permanent but could be interim depending on how they do at providing services?A: (Dr. White) Yes.		
	Comment: To Dr. White, Suzanne and Warren, job well done. The Mental Health Commission made a motion to state you could do whatever you had to do. And you did it. Thank you.

	Q: A:	For the Full-Service Partnership clients, what is the transition of service provided? Some clients are receiving intense case management. It has not been so intense in the last three weeks. When can they expect for things to ramp back up? (Warren Hayes) To ensure services continue, we did a very intensive case staffing of everybody on the Full-Service Partnership program. During that process, we found individuals who could actually transition to outpatient care which we did. Initially we had fifty clients, but after transitioning those who qualify to outpatient care, that number was reduced considerably. There is still an opportunity for those clients to return to the intensive level of treatment if required in the future. For those clients who still required the intensive care, we kept in the program.		
	A:	Mental Health Systems (MHS) has been assigned to be the provider for the FSP programs. The MHS staff got on a plane, flew here and met with the remaining Anka staff. MHS immediately hired the remaining staff and gave them a raise. This remaining crew of Anka staff know the clients. They are on the job serving those clients. We wanted to ensure there was a service provider who could provide the required services and also that there was continuity of care for the clients. The clients will have the same team they were familiar working with. For the FSP, there is now definitely sufficient staff with MHS to serve the case load. (Dr. White) In May after the announcement of the bankruptcy, there was staff attrition in these programs. Programs are still not back to prior levels. We are working to rebuild that staff level.		

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	staff as they really tried to hang in there as long as possible. Some were willing to stay even after the lights were turned off. They really hung in there. We appreciate the Anka staff that remained.		
	 Q: For the Anka people who remained, where they distributed throughout programs? MHS staff, are they new staff or the same staff that the County has worked with previously? A: (Warren Hayes): Seven FSP staff were kept. Most importantly the Administrative Clerk. There is a Clinician and four Case Managers. This is sufficient staff for the current caseload. This staffing provides sufficient level of care for this team approach. 		
	We met with MHS leadership today. MHS determined strong leadership is needed for the programs and they are working on hiring quality leadership now.		
	 Q: Are there any peers, consumers in leadership positions? Any jobs available for peers? A: (Warren Hayes) I met with the Anka staff. The Case Managers are individuals with lived experience. They are totally committed to their clients. A: (Dr. White and Suzanne Tavano) Center Point (substance use provider based in San Rafael) and BACS (based in Oakland) are evaluating the situation and determining staffing needs now. 		
	 Psychiatric Emergency Services (PES) There has been stated a concern about the children's space in PES and a request for MHSA funds to remodel the area We held an emergency meeting with PES a few days ago No one should have to wait to get services

	One of the longest running units in the state. In the state, only 24 counties have this unit. Most do not. Many are more restricted units. We want to do everything to have this unit be a high functioning service to offer the community. We want to keep it open and serve everybody who walks through the door. Our model is an open door to all. As a result, a lot more people are coming through and more situations are presented. We need to keep up with the changes, the times and move forward.		
	o (Warren Hayes) CPAW's role is advocacy to bring about change. That is valuable. PES is not controlled by Behavioral Health. CPAW is working correctly. Issues start in CPAW committees. The Agenda Readiness Form (ARF) is part of this process – issues defined. Those issues are presented to CPAW with stakeholder input as advisors to the leadership. Issues

	 Q: Did the Agenda Readiness Form (ARF) have all issues re PES? Do we need another form for additional items? Tuesday meeting open to stakeholders? A: (Warren Hayes) The ARF has the issues defined. A: (Dr. White) Yes stakeholders are invited to the meeting next Tuesday. 		
	Comment: It was a privacy issue. Anyone at PES could open the door to the private room. Can see through windows in the area. But that can be an easy fix. Take patients to another area than those rooms. A: (Dr. White) Yes. We can find an immediate then more permanent solution later.		
	 Q: Can children get food? A: (Dr. White) Yes. Prepared food or microwavable food (i.e. macaroni and cheese and peanut butter sandwiches) 		
	Comment: Want to say thank you to Jennifer Tuipulotu, Candace Collier, Janet Costa and Kathi McLaughlin who spearheaded this point of awareness. Its all of us working together. Something seems like it's really happening. That's great. Appreciation for the new leadership as well. We should thank the young woman who spoke about PES initially and we should update her as to the progress on resolving the issues at PES.
