Highlights of news to share and areas discussed at recent Contra Costa Behavioral Health Services (CCBHS) supported stakeholder meetings:

Adult Committee

 Adult Committee meetings will resume in the near future. Date of meeting will be announced.

Aging and Older Adult Committee (AOA) (May 11th)

- The Older Adult COVID-19 Workgroup discussed the long and short term side effects of COVID-19 and seniors who may need additional support.
- We had informative presentations from Abran Aviles-Scott, LMFT, Senior Peer Counseling Program Coordinator. Abran gave an introduction and presented on the Senior Peer Counseling Program which trains senior volunteers age 55+ to become counselors. We discussed the need of Farsi speaking Senior Peer volunteers across Contra Costa.
- Abran also presented on the Contra Costa Elder Abuse Prevention Project (EAPP) and how
 to refer individuals to the program by submitting a client referral application. It was
 suggested that the above programs also be presented at a Quality of Care Meeting as well
 as the Commission Meeting.
- Discussed transportation services and barriers for seniors and those with low-income. Uber is free for low income individuals who apply and are approved through the City of Richmond's Transportation Department.
- Our next Older Adult COVID-19 Workgroup meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, June 8th, 2022 from 2:00 pm--3:30pm on Zoom. We will have a presentation on Mobility Matters from Elaine Welsh (CEO of Mobility Matters) and an update on COVID-19 in Contra Costa County from Sara Levin, MD, Deputy Health Officer.

Alcohol and Other Drugs (AOD) Advisory Board (April 27th)













VI-SPDAT score


Length of Time Homeless Who is seeking supportive housing?


